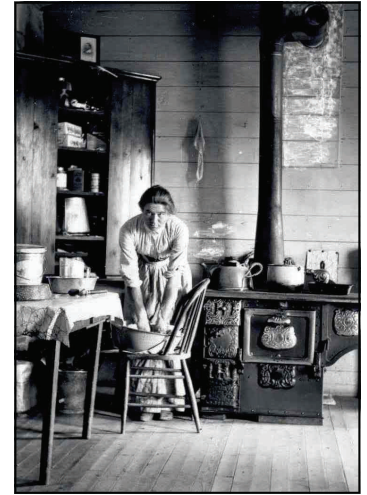

PHOTOGRAPHING MONTANA 1894 - 1928: THE WORLD OF EVELYN CAMERON

APRIL 5 - JULY 2

For more than thirty years spanning the late nineteenth and twentieth centuries, Evelyn Cameron photographed the landscape, wildlife, and people of eastern Montana. Evelyn took thousands of photographs of her world the rural life, badlands, and ranch characters of the real west. Over 40 large format prints made from Cameron's original glass-plate and nitrate negatives are featured in this exhibit, which is based on the book *Photographing Montana* by Donna Lucey, a former editor with Time-Life Books. Both in Lucey's book and in the exhibit, Cameron's own words culled from 30 years of her diaries reveal Evelyn's personal feelings behind her photographs. *Photographing Montana* offers an intimate view of rural life on the Northern Plains.

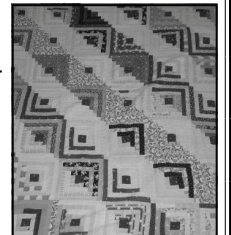
ART SHOW

Even narrowing the field considerably to just Shakespeare’s great pairings – Kate and Petruchio, Romeo and Juliet, Othello and Desdemona – no one holds a candle to these two delightful wits. As their friends conspire to bring these two wagers of a ‘merry war’ of words together, and the evil brother Don John plots to destroy them all, Shakespeare introduces one of his greatest comic gifts: Dogberry the constable just to keep things from getting too out of hand.

Since writing to you in last quarter's newsletter, a lot has happened. Some music events at the MonDak are now supported in part by the Williston Area Foundation's STAR Fund. One of the events supported by the STAR Fund was "An Evening with Evelyn Cameron." We had 110 people come April 9th to hear first person interpreter Karen Stevenson and local band "Cameron". There were many new faces; people came from as far away as Culbertson, Wibaux and Miles City. The center gallery was overflowing for the presentation. Thank you everyone who came. It was a great night.

THE NEW DEAL IN THE MONDAK

The Civilian Conservation Corps was active 1933-1942. This was one of the more successful New Deal programs initiated by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The CCC had a huge impact on Montana, including \$42 million dollars into the state's economy (\$665 million today). 40,800 young men from all over the US were sent to Montana to serve.

In eastern Montana the CCC worked on soil erosion projects, and here in Sidney, we had Company 2471, that worked on project BR-30, the BR standing for Bureau of Reclamation. The camp was officially at Ridgelawn, north of Sidney, established May 17, 1936 - 75 years ago. There isn't much left of the camp, but the impact in irrigation is ongoing.

At the MonDak Heritage Center, we only have a few photos from the CCC near Sidney. No artifacts, no documents, no oral histories. Pretty amazing for having hundreds of young men come through until Co. 2471 moved to Terry in October 1941. Do you have anything to share about the CCC in the area?
